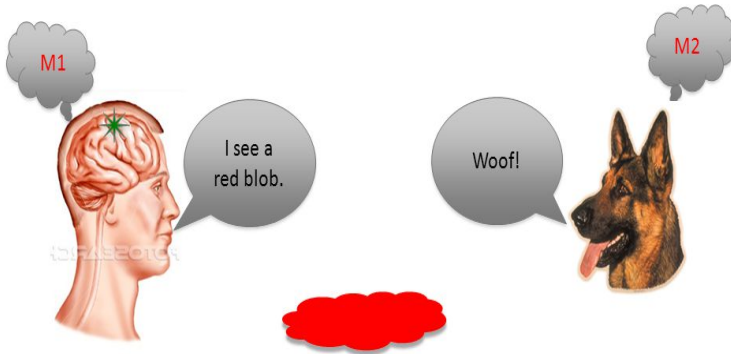


Physicalism, Or Something Near Enough

Problem for the Identity Theory: Multiple Realizability

- Are mental states just identical to brain states?
- Problem: It's logically possible that two guys are in the same type mental state but different type brain states.
- But if $M1 = B1$ and $M1 = M2$ it is *not* logically possible that $B1 \neq B2$!
